





Each brochure is packaged as a PDF which can be printed as a single double-sided sheet and tri-folded. The three brochures are shown below with links to go directly to the PDFs.



I asked Felix to summarize his volunteer experience, including collaborating with David Harris. His account is below:



Why I chose to volunteer for the MetroWest Chess Club:

Volunteering at the MetroWest Chess Club allows me to talk about a game that I enjoy, and sharing ideas and concepts with other players only makes it better. It's a great experience to listen to other players' opinions as it is to provide my own input. I love to talk chess with people, whether it is going over games, explaining positional maneuvers over the display board, or typing up lessons, and in this way, I feel I can help the MetroWest chess community. The MetroWest chess community always has a great amount of people with whom to discuss chess, and with that comes a great variety of chess minds.

How I balance chess and academics:

As a student, I find my time for my hobby limited, but the time I spend teaching at the MetroWest Chess Club allows me to keep in touch with the

game. Teaching not only allows me to spread what I know, but also requires me to book up and make sure that I actually know what I am teaching. Aside from volunteering at the MetroWest Chess Club, I am also the captain of the Boston University Academy Chess team and leader/teacher of the school club. While I may be a student, it is important to me to keep in touch with the royal game.

What is my favorite lesson?

My favorite lesson was probably one I gave near Halloween 2009. It was titled "Trick or Treat" or something like that, and it featured several studies that simply blew my mind, such as Sam Loyd's famous "Excelsior" study. When I gave the lesson, I just wanted to show people what amazed me and hopefully amazed them as well. I don't always have something typed up for everyone, so sometimes I analyze games. Another one of my favorite lessons was a productive analysis session with a strong class B player. He maneuvered his pieces to obtain a sizeable advantage over his opponent, but was unsure how to press the advantage and instead agreed to a draw. I recalled a similar situation in one of Karpov's games and suggested a similar strategy, which eventually won in all lines.

My partnership with David Harris:

Mr. Harris is a witty and strong expert and I am excited to take on the responsibility of instructing the MetroWest Chess Club community with him. I sat in on one of his lessons one day, and he brought in a lesson on the English featuring an interesting game between Karpov and Yusupov. He took care to explain the details behind the position and explain the motives behind the moves.

Always open to more teachers:

I mentioned that teaching chess is a great way to improve one's game; the input from the audience as well as fact-checking is beneficial to chess. That said, we are also available for more volunteers. We don't even require you to be a constant teacher like Mr. Harris and I, but if you have a gem of chess wisdom that you are comfortable sharing with the MetroWest Chess Community, we encourage you to lead a teaching session!
