## NIGEL SHORT CRUSHES SIMUL FIELD; JOHN CURDO SWEEPS FRAMINGHAM OCTAGONAL

British Champion Nigel Short defeated all eleven players who faced him in a simultaneous exhibition in Framingham on Saturday, October 27. It was the first appearance ever in the US by Short, at age 19 the world's youngest Grandmaster. Opposing him were Weston Master Lou Mercuri, MACA President George Mirijanian of Fitchburg, New England Women's Co-champion Vesna Dimitrijevic of Cambridge, Paul Heising of Ashland, Don Wolitzer of Wellesley, Warren Pinches of Boston, Rebecca Targonski of Woburn, Greg Kaden of Weston, Tom Sifter of Quincy, Dick Reil of Ashland, and Peter Miles of Bellingham. The field put up stiff resistance, with most games going into the fourth hour, but ultimately all succumbed. The exhibition was sponsored by the Framingham Chess Club. Short will tape a segment for the Shelby Lyman World Chess Championship telecasts, to be aired 10PM Saturday November 3 on WGBX-Channel 44, before returning to England. His visit to the US was undertaken to discuss arrangements for the proposed match between him and US Champion Lev Alburt, planned for Massachusetts cable TV in January.

The following day, Sunday, October 28, John Curdo demolished the top section of the Framingham Chess Club's one-day octagonal, "Tal Tales", scoring 3-0. Curdo annihilated Jorge Godoy of Marlboro in Round 1 with a whirlwind attack from his favorite Queen's Gambit--Tchigorin, downed Greg Berman, a Kentucky student at Boston University, in Round 2, and captured first place with another kingside assault, this time from a Leningrad Dutch, against second-seeded Alex Slive of Cambridge. Coincidentally, Slive, Berman and Godoy shared second at 2-1. The second octagonal section was won by Edwin Burnett of Wakefield, also 3-0, with Shayne Bowler of Dover NH and Robert Gallucci of Lynn tying for second, while unrated Martin Kreuzer of Waltham impressively slashed his way to a 3-0 score in the third section, ahead of Robert Donahue of Cambridge. It developed afterwards that Kreuzer, a recent emigre from Germany, has an unpublished 2180 FIDE rating and in recent rated games gained a yet-to-be-published provisional USCF rating over 2300. (TDs beware.) Warren Pinches directed the 23-player field for the sponsoring Framingham Chess Club.
