CURDO AND EPP TIE IN LARGEST WEEKNIGHT TOURNAMENT IN NEW ENGLAND HISTORY; MATHESON WINS FRAMINGHAM PLAYER-OF-THE-YEAR

John Curdo of North Billerica and Dr. Edward Epp of Weston each scored $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ to share first in the 2nd Mark Bond Classic, ending December 15 at the Framingham Chess Club. A six-way tie for third place at 4-1 included Alan Shaw of Somerville, Pat Walker of Newton, Rob Huntington of Wayland, Kirk Petty of Milford, Dave Ferreira of Watertown, and Sergey Spivakovsky of Concord; Huntington, Petty, Ferreira, and Spivakovsky were also equal first Under 2000. William McAllister of Framingham and Svein Abrahamsen of Needham shared first Under 1750 at 3-2, while Jody Overland of Framingham won top honors Under 1500, also at 3-2. The tournament, the only weeknight Grand Prix tournament in New England, attracted a 58-player field, which is beleived to be the largest in New England history.

As the last rated tournament on the Framingham Chess Club Tuesday night schedule, the Mark Bond Classic also decided the 1987 Framingham Playerof-the-Year title, which goes to the player who compiles the most points in weeknight tournaments during the year. Bob Matheson of Natick clinched the coveted award in the final round, edging Mike LeBlanc of Westboro by a halfpoint. At the start of the Mark Bond Classic, Huntington, James Matthews of Dedham, and Dave Palmer of Sudbury were also contenders, but Matheson scored 2-1 in the first three rounds to eliminate Huntington and Palmer and pull a full point ahead of LeBlanc. Matthews, who led the Player-of-the-Year race much of the year, self-destructed in rounds 2 and 3, being upset in turn by Slawomir Luczak of Worcester and Overland, ending his bid for the title. Fate intervened in round 4, when LeBlanc had a minor auto accident and could not play; however, Matheson failed to clinch the title, losing to Spivakovsky. In the final round, only a Matheson loss coupled with a LeBlanc win could bring the contestants even (LeBlanc would then win the title on the tiebreak, best percentage), and through most of the final round it appeared exactly that

would happen. LeBlanc crushed Kent Townley of Marlboro in a game so hair-raising LeBlanc inquired whether the TD knew CPR. Meanwhile, Matheson's game against Leonard Arsenault of Leominster steadily deteriorated. However, Matheson fought back in the last few minutes of his game to salvage a draw, pushing his 1987 total to $22\frac{1}{2}$ points, and becoming the club's fifth Player-of-the-Year. At 1745, Matheson was the lowest-rated player by nearly 200 points to win the title; he said he hoped his victory would be an inspiration to the lower-rated players in the club.

The tournament was a holocaust for the higher-rated players; of the 12 players rated above 2000 (four Masters and eight Experts) only six finished with plus scores. Apart from the previously-described woes of Matthews (rated 2040), second-seeded Lou Mercuri (2303) lost to Mike Grant of Boston and withdrew; Bijan Haririan (2232) of Maynard lost in rounds 1 and 3 to Abrahamsen (1621) and Mark Fins (1821) of Newton and withdrew; Drew Sarkisian (2122) of Oxford lost and drew to Ferreira (1945) and Michael Dreese (1778) of Newton and withdrew; and Bruce Downing (2102) of Foxboro, after collecting his Challenge Cup trophy, was shelled by Henry Blackwell (1591) of Framingham in the first round and withdrew. Several lower-rated players had the tournament of their lives: notable among the mice that roared was Overland (1390) who drew Fins (1821), defeated Menno Koning (1777) of Dover, defeated Matthews (2040), drew with Petty (1961), and was only stopped by Spivakovsky (1937) in the final round. Abrahamsen (1621) notched wins over Haririan (2232) and William G. Michael (1921) of West Bridgewater, while Blackwell (1591) defeated Downing (2102) and LeBlanc (1835), and had a strong game against Ferreira (1945) before succumbing to his nemesis, the clock.

Indeed, even the eventual prize-winners had a turbulent flight. After three rounds only five players had a perfect score: Curdo, Shaw, Brad Merrill of Westboro, David Drumm of Framingham, and Ferreira. Epp had slipped off the pace with a draw against Petty in the third round. In round 4 Shaw (2287) was dumped by Ferreira (1945), while Curdo (2473) barely salvaged a draw against Drumm (2026). Merrill had to take a half-point bye, so Ferreira, the fifteenth-seed, was the sole leader going into the final round. In the finale Curdo dispatched Ferreira to secure a share of first; later Epp downed Merrill to join him. Shaw defeated Drumm to advance to 4-1; Walker, Huntington, Petty, and Spivakovsky won respectively against Grant, Jorge Godoy of Framingham, John Fanning of Scituate, and Overland to squeeze into the winners' circle.

The annual tournament is named in honor of Mark Bond, the club's cofounder and first President.
