
## Al Ward



WARD, Alfred Giffin Age 78, died in his Framingham home, Monday, October 17, 2016. He was born in Cambridge on September 11, 1938, son of the late Alfred F. and Blanche (Giffin) Ward of Framingham. After Tufts and for the rest of his life, he worked at any job that would sustain a frugal lifestyle and leave him free to pursue his interests, including the care and sheltering of any animal in need, especially the many homeless cats who came to his door, until his health began to fail two years ago.

Al is survived by his sisters, Sheila Ward Chayes and Kathryn Bjork, and brother-in-law Paul Bjork. He is also survived by niece Karin (Bjork) Manchaca and companion Keith McMahon, and by nephew Stephen Bjork and his wife Georgett.
